Nancy O. Andrews was most recently the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Low Income Investment Fund (LIIF). LIIF is a Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) that has invested \$2.2 billion in community projects serving more than 2 million people. LIIF's investments have leveraged \$10.8 billion in private capital for poor communities in 31 states across the U.S. and generated \$57 billion in benefits for families and society. Previously, Andrews served as the Deputy Director of the Ford Foundation's Office of Program Related Investments, where she assisted in the management of a \$130 million social investment portfolio. She also designed and launched the foundation's housing policy program, which focused on national housing and capital market issues. Andrews holds an M.S. in Urban Planning with a concentration in Real Estate Finance from Columbia University.

Dr. Deena Chisolm is the Nationwide Foundation Endowed Chair in Health Equity Research, Director of the Center for Child Health Equity and Outcomes Research, and Vice-President for Health Services Research in the Abigail Wexner Research Institute at Nationwide Children's Hospital. She is also a Professor of Pediatrics and Public Health at The Ohio State University. Her research focuses on improving health and healthcare for children and families, with over 100 peer-reviewed publications on pediatric health services, outcomes, and disparities. Her current projects explore how health literacy, health policy, and social factors influence the health of at-risk adolescents transitioning to adulthood. Her research is funded by agencies including the National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities and the National Institute on Drug Abuse. Dr. Chisolm is the immediate past Chairman of the Ohio Commission on Minority Health and serves as a Board member for the Health Policy Institute of Ohio. She holds a BS in Biological Science Education from Miami University, MS in Preventive Medicine, and Doctorate in Public Health from The Ohio State University.

Dr. Emmanuel F. Drabo, PhD, is an Assistant Professor of Health Policy and Management within the Bloomberg School of Public Health. Dr. Drabo is a health economist, modeler, and health services researcher. His research primarily exploits economic epidemiology, economic evaluation, health services research, and systems science methods to estimate the impact of health interventions and public health policy changes on morbidity and mortality from infectious diseases (e.g., HIV/AIDS and vaccine-preventable diseases) and major chronic conditions (e.g., cardiovascular diseases, dementias), as well as the broader social value of these interventions. His interest lies in the value assessment of interventions aimed at improving population health. He holds a doctoral degree in Health Economics from the University of Southern California. He also completed a postdoctoral fellowship in Primary Care and Outcomes Research within the Basu Lab at Stanford University.
